MANAGER'S NEWS CHANGES TO THE RULES AND REGULATIONS:

Patio Awning

41a). A Patio Awning must be attached to the Park Model or Manufactured Home on the patio side only. A patio awning requires installation of awning support members, which must be appropriately anchored into the ground, or to a deck, in accordance with the City of Yuma Building Codes and Standards. When a deck supports a patio awning a minimum setback of seven (7) feet is required. When the Patio awning is NOT supported by a deck a minimum set-

back of three (3) feet is required. The patio awnings may have an overhang not to exceed one (1) foot provided the overhang does not extend into the required set back area. Uncovered decorative extensions may extend one (1) foot into the set back area (Revised 01/18/10) and must be made of non-combustible material and spaced not more than two (2) feet on centers. The surface area of the awning must be included in the calculations for the 50% lot coverage rule. (Revised 03/08/2011).

Rear Area Free Standing Patio Awnings

41b). The area to the rear of a Unit may be covered by a Pergola Design Awning with the following restrictions: The covered area may not exceed 200 square feet (if design is larger than 200 square feet then a City of Yuma building permit must accompany the application submitted to the ACC). The cover may not be attached to any structure on the lot. The vertical uprights supporting the canopy must be metal and anchored into concrete (a concrete form inspection is required prior to the concrete pour). The upright supports must maintain the three-foot (3') set back requirements from the property lines. All of the other building materials in the awning must be of Alumawood quality. The canopy may not extend beyond the sides of the unit however; a decorative extension may extend no more than one foot (12") to the rear of the canopy and

said extensions must be made of non-combustible material and be spaced no more than two feet (2') on centers. The surface area of the canopy must be included in the calculations for the 50% lot coverage rule. (Revised 03/08/2011).

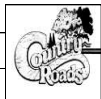

The 4-wheelers ended an eventful season on March 21 with a trip to McPherson Pass in the Kofa National Wildlife Refuge to view the desert in bloom. It is always a treat to see the Castle Dome Mountains from within the Kofa range and feast our eyes on the variety of cacti. The following day we celebrated the very busy season with a final margarita party and potluck.

March 7th was designated as the "woman's" day to drive. Of the thirteen vehicles on the trip to the Black Butte Mountain in SE California, seven were driven by women. JoAnne and Dale Sessions led the trip, and Dale suggested that since everything went so well, that perhaps we may have two "woman's" trips next year. (The men groaned, but admitted that it was fun watching the scenery rather than continuously watching the road.) He encouraged all women to learn to drive their 4 x 4 vehicles in order to be

prepared for emergencies. Probably due to the high winds that day, we were unable to see the deer that are often viewed in that area.

On February 21, a convoy of 17 vehicles carrying 31 people went east to Wellton and then south into the Barry Goldwater Range. First we traveled by the Baker Peaks and stopped and enjoyed viewing the Bakers Tanks. Then we went on to the Betty Lee Mine, located approximately 20 miles south of Wellton in the Copper Mts. Seven in the group had never gone on a trip with us, and 11 had not previously been to the mine, so many hiked up to the mine after lunch. We learned from JoAnne Sessions that the Betty Lee mine was in use from 1910 to 1939 and contained copper, gold and some silver. (Note: a permit is required to enter the Barry Goldwater Range. It can be easily obtained at the Marine Base.)

If you wish to join us next year, be sure to have your vehicle equipped with a working CB radio. Watch for the sign-up sheets outside the Activity Office next November, as we look forward to a busy season again next year!

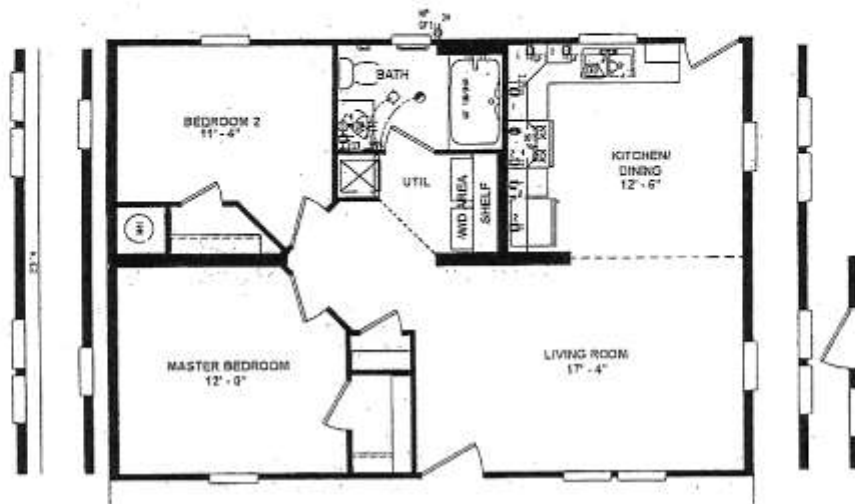

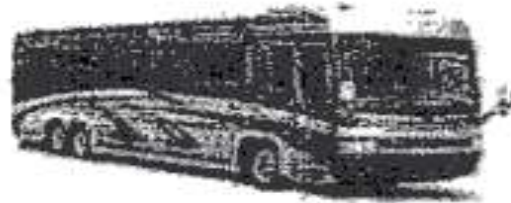
